Sacrifice and Worship

Sacrifice (n): an act of offering to a deity something precious | especially: the killing of a victim on an altar: *Merriam-Webster*

An act of worship expressing submission to a deity and seeking his/her favor; in the Biblical context the sacrifice was also atoning for one's sins.

The Hebrew word for sacrifice comes from the root meaning "to approach" and signified that which is brought near, or offered to God. *Illustrated Dictionary of the Bible*
